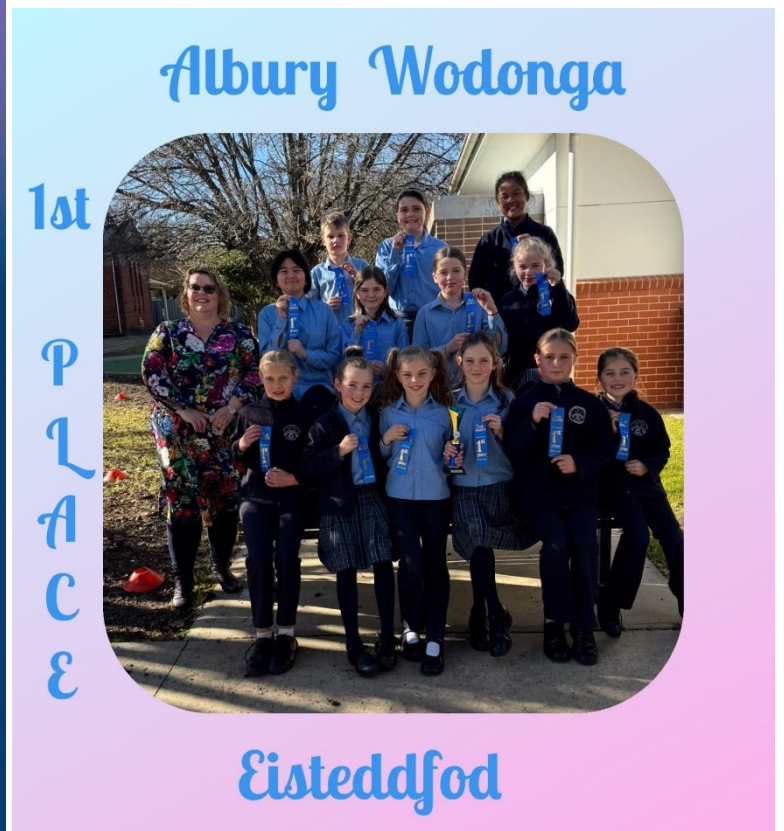

The Book Fair will be open to families for book purchasing on the following days:

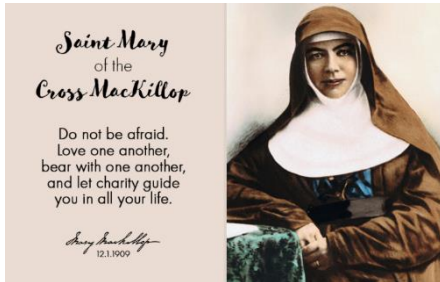

BLUEARTH

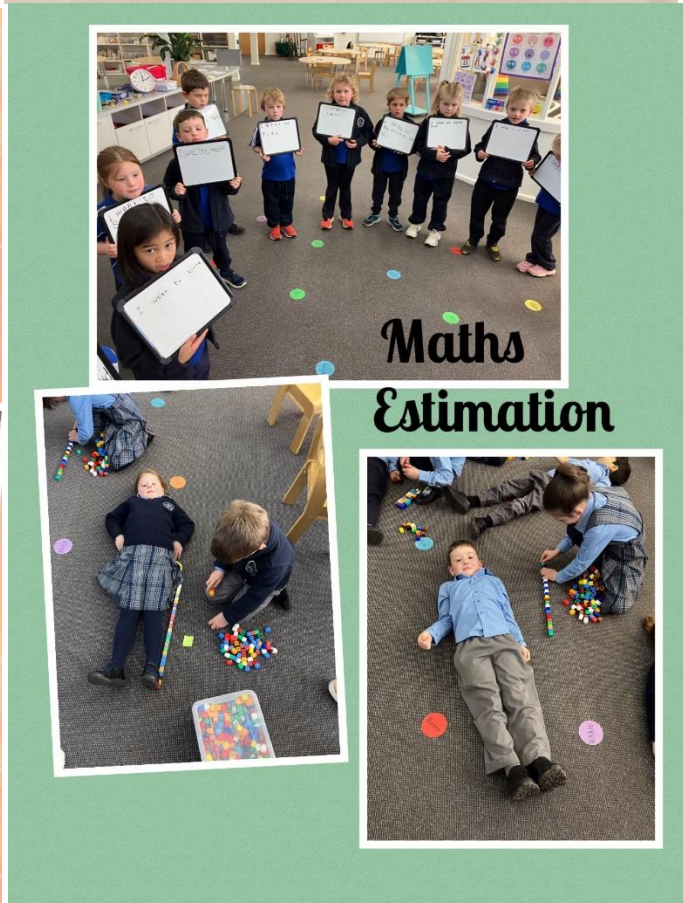
Students enjoyed working in partners with one another to build strategies to complete set tasks. They have played dodgeball and other fun games with the year six students also.

YEAR 1

Twice a week we send home 'Busy Bee/Be Kind Bee' with deserving people in the class. Please take care of our friend when he visits your home.



LETI

Last week, the JLC looked at 'Light' and our key understandings for this term.

- Science is a part of everyday life.
- We use our senses to learn about the world around us.
- Light comes from many sources.
- There are many ways to produce sound.
- Objects move in different ways.

The Year 1 students already have some fantastic ideas to explore their responses to the key understanding.

LITERACY

We have continued to work on expanding our sentences in Literacy this fortnight. The students are writing wonderful sentences and are transferring the knowledge learnt into their Big Write. They have written to the topics 'What can I hear?' and 'Light' over the last two weeks.

In phonics, we have studied 'ar' as in car and are currently studying 'or' as in corn. We have explored the sounds or phonemes and the letters in each word.

This week we are starting our study of 'Fantastic Mr Fox' by exploring the language used in the book.

MATHS

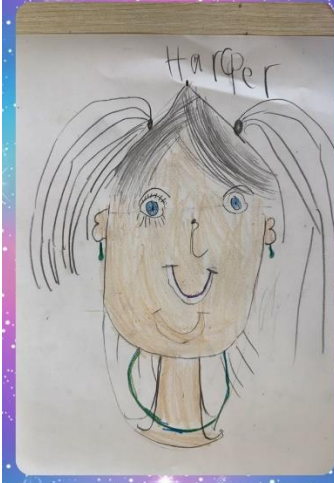
In Maths, we are reviewing previously taught concepts in our 'Daily Review' and have started to investigate mass and capacity using non- standard forms of measurement.

HOMEWORK

The students have taken on the new homework format and are becoming 'Word Detectives' to find 'oy', 'ar' and this week 'or' as in corn words. The homework focus is based on what we are learning in class in our phonics lessons.

ART

The Year 1 students had an impromptu art lesson on Tuesday and drew self-portraits and learned how to draw 'Joy' from Inside Out.



YEAR 2

LITERACY

Last term our Year 2 students completed the PAT Spelling Test 3. This was a great opportunity to look at how our students are travelling with their spelling. We were very impressed with their results, but it also allowed us to see concepts that we needed to review. We have tweaked our Spelling this term to tackle them, this may mean that our lists may be covering rules and concepts from earlier in the year.

RELIGION

We have been exploring Celebrations as part of our 'Sacraments are Special' unit. We encourage you to chat about the celebrations you have had in your family and their common elements.

MATHS

Over the last two weeks we have continued to look at Probability. We were lucky enough to do some probability tasks with Smarties.

LETI

Our 'Light, Sound & Motion' Unit has kicked off with a bang! We divided the JLC into three groups and went on a Senses Safari! Each group explored the five senses with various activities. Everyone (including the teachers) enjoyed this and then last week we focused on Light. Both these activities have led to many questions that we are keen to investigate. We encourage you to chat with your children about what they are finding out as we continue our investigations.

HOMEWORK

As mentioned in our class newsletter and last newsletter, this term the expectations have increased for our Year 2s. We would like students to continue with reading each night during the school week (Monday-Friday, five nights), complete daily Look, Cover, Write, Check with spelling words and now submit one spelling activity for the week. We have also included a simple math homework sheet that is optional and can be submitted on Fridays along with spelling homework and reading logs.

SENIOR NEWS

We are off to a busy term. Congratulations to Phoebe Cresswell on appearing on Auskicker of the Week. Phoebe spoke well, answering questions and having a chat with Joel Selwood. This is a credit to her willingness to send in a video to apply to be one of many who wish to be chosen. As we said - "You have to be in it to win it!" Well done Phoebe for putting yourself out there.



Congratulations to our students in the SLC who are part of the St Mary's choir who received another 1st Place in their division. These children gave up their lunch times and work on Thursday afternoons, practicing with their talented music teacher Rachel Campbell. Their success is a credit to Mrs Campbell and to our young leaders.

LEADERSHIP

Congratulations to some of our Year 6 students who are starting to use initiative and take on extra roles. Well done to Willow and Zahlee who are learning to umpire on Saturday mornings, we have heard great reports. Thank you to Zahlee, Violet and Kirk for jumping in and organising assembly. All of our Year 6's will work with Mrs Pasqualotto to run Anti Bullying Week in Action.

SCIENCE INQUIRY

We have been busy in inquiry lessons, looking at how to write up a science experiment. The students are starting to ask questions, formulate hypotheses and work through steps to create an experiment. They are becoming more aware of dependent and independent variables. We are currently observing the effects of different liquids on nails, seeing which will cause rust. We hypothesised that salt water will cause the most rust.

ART NEWS

The Year 2 - 6 students have recently completed their 'X-Ray Animal' Indigenous style artworks that we began during NAIDOC Week. They created the animals using white gel pen on black paper and glued their animals to 3D contour plateaus (hills) that were made from cardboard. They glued the animal and hill to a background piece, which consists of handprints that replicate the ochre spray stencil hand prints that indigenous Australians have been making on rock walls for thousands of years. Foundation and Year 1 students have recently completed 'Beach Landscape' collages by tearing paper that has been painted in ocean water colours. These students have also completed 'Indigenous Australian Flags' from coloured paper. The flags were donned with acrylic paint handprints and accented with dot painting as part of their NAIDOC Week art piece.
